Coconut Oil Production

Even before we arrived in Mozambique we had thought about starting a plant that would produce virgin coconut oil and jobs for Mozambicans. This has become a reality as a new business, Africa Oil Works, started producing oil in June. The manager is a Mozambican WR employee who is transitioning to own part of the business.

To make this unique oil, the inside of the coconut is ground into a finely grated pulp, then put on the large stove top heated by burning the empty husks and shells. After an hour of being turned continuously (photo right) and drying to about 10 percent moisture, it is put into a cylinder and pressed, producing crystal clear oil worth at least \$4 per liter on the spot. \$10 a liter in a South African supermarket

- all this from about 60 cents worth of coconut. Who said money doesn't grow on trees? What makes this so exciting is Mozambique has the potential to be one of the top five leading coconut oil producers. Currently we are working on marketing the oil and getting the word out about its healthy properties.



Blessed or Cursed?

In April we held a facilitator's training as well as our first AP seminar in Maputo. It was an exciting, stretching time as we attempted to minister in our small group in Portuguese. God touched people and many are asking for more seminars. We will participate in a coordinator's training in August which will make it possible for us to hold seminars without having to rely on our friends from South Africa to come help us. The purpose of Ancient Paths Seminars is to establish in individuals the biblical foundations

that cause life to work and people to prosper from one generation to the next. In the Ancient Paths Seminar, we minister to the participants regarding seven critical times in life when we are more vulnerable to receive either "God's true image", or "Satan's false image" of our own identity and destiny. This addresses a tremendous need in a country that lives under generational curses, a history of war, poverty, disease, and other emotional and spiritual attacks.

Microenterprise Development

Rachel went to Beira the end of April to work with a group of women on the microenterprise development course and to look at possibilities of starting a sewing business. They are teaching the course to others including their workers. Two of the women took a sewing and cutting course (no patterns here, you have to design your own) and will teach sewing and design. Please pray for good markets for their products.

It was a great joy to spend time with Tanneken Fros at the end of the week. She continues her ministry with the churches, the orphans and physically challenged people in the Dondo area. She kept me on my toes as we would arrive at a meeting by saying, "Rachel you can share something here." It was good practice for being instant in season and out!
