One of our longer sessions at WR International in Baltimore was with the micro-enterprise development team. They are a group of energetic and intelligent financial experts with various backgrounds. As we talked about what Samuel Grottis, the WR Southern Africa Director wants us to do, their response

was, "Oh, you are talking about BDS" (Business Development Service). Micro-enterprise development in the strictest sense of the word works with existing businesses and strengths that already exist by providing loans and some counsel or advice. However, business development services typically do not loan money, they just advise (like

SCORE in the U.S.). Samuel seems to be asking for a combination of these two concepts.

So, I asked the next obvious questions. "Is anyone currently doing what we are being asked to do? Is there a working model out there?" The answer might give you a clue as to the challenge we face. It was, "Well, not exactly."

What Will We Do?

We are asked this question often. One answer is that we will focus on learning, listening and observing. Too many times we only focus on "doing" and there will be so much to do, it could be overwhelming. We need to focus on hearing daily from the Father and doing what He asks of us. Jesus had crowds around Him constantly but He learned to only do what the Father asked of Him.

Recently someone shared a dream they had of our home in Mozambique. He said it was like a school and there was a large banquet spread out. This fits our vision well--to train trainers, to disciple, to use the many tools God has given us over the years and to invite people to the banquet, the feast God has prepared for them.

Language School - Brazil or Mozambique?

We are planning to start our adventure in Brazil in September. You may ask why and there are several reasons.

We will be able to concentrate on learning Portu-

- guese and not be distracted with getting settled in Mozambique.
- We were able to connect with a language teacher close to Recife and it will be less expensive than Maputo.
- We will return to Indiana in December and attend our son Joel's wedding January 1. He was recently engaged to Ellen Stevenson of Lafayette, Indiana.
- In January we will fly to Mozambique.

- The official language is Portuguese but there are many other tribal languages spoken.
- Religions Christian 30%, Muslim 20%, Indigenous African and other 50%
- Government multiparty republic with one legislative house
- Area 799,380 km (2 times the size of California)
- Capital Maputo (pop. 1.1 million) We will live in Maputo.
- Climate tropical to subtropical
- Average earnings per year -US \$210
- Over 2/3 of the population are very poor earning 22c-89c per day
- Life expectancy at birth 35 years
- Literacy 42% of population 15 years old and older

- End of civil war 1991(?)
 There are many repercussions from the war that the country is still recovering from.
- Major floods 2000 and 2001


